



The Problem Oriented Policing Team (POP), led by 1 Sergeant and 7 Officers, includes 3 School Resource Officers, a Homeless Liaison Officer, and the Community Behavioral Health Assessment Team. They focus on homelessness, outreach, and addressing recurring issues impacting residents, businesses, and visitors.

MPD currently has 3 K9s to support Patrol and Investigations. K9 Emmy and K9 Dino are used to respond to alarm activation calls, requests for vehicle and building searches, and to track fleeing or barricaded suspects. K9 Nala specializes in narcotics detection, Nala is a vital asset to the Homeland Security Investigations Task Force (HSI), collaborating with federal agents and task force officers to combat narcotics and money laundering in Southern California.



SWAT

The Southwest Cities Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) team provides a ready response to situations that are beyond the capabilities of traditionally equipped and trained department personnel. SWAT team members' duties include serving high risk search and arrest warrants, performing hostage rescues, subduing barricaded suspects, and engaging heavily-armed criminals.

VOLUNTEERS

The program's primary goals are to help participants explore career paths in law enforcement and inspire them to become responsible and engaged citizens within their communities and the nation. As part of the program, all members are required to attend a Police Explorer Academy within their first year of joining. This year, the Menifee Police Department successfully hosted its own academy, proudly graduating nine Explorers. Brining the programs total to 17.
